NWCCP's Community Partnership Project Fund

- What is it: Funding available for community and iwi projects to do
 wilding pine control
 - 26 projects currently funded in the 2020-2021 year
 - \$2.5M planned to be available in 2021-2022
- National Wilding Conifer Control Programme team are currently developing a contestable process






NWCCP's Community Partnership Project Fund


- Likely it will be a 3 Stage Process:
 - 1. Call for applications in April
 - 2. Funding decision in July-Aug
 - 3. Funding allocated Aug-Sept (so that work can commence from October)





NWCCP's Community Partnership Project Fund

- Eligibility
- Funding Process
 - Funding is allocated to Regional Councils, who then work with the successful project applicants to agree how the work will be contracted and completed
 - In the event you agree with the Council that you will be contracted to do or manage the work, you will become a contractual partner.
 - As a contractual partner, you will inherit the same obligations as MPI and the Regional Council in regards to Health and Safety, procurement, and financial reporting

What to include in a funding application

- 1. Build your case the Call to Action
- 2. Define your approach you have a clear plan







1. Build Your Case

- Who are you and what problem are you solving? Define the problem.
- Why should the funding body help you? Why are you the best placed to receive this funding?
- What are the ongoing benefits of this funding to the funding organisation and/ or the wider public good?



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2. Define your approach

- How will you successfully deliver this project?
- Have a clear strategy, management plan, objectives, milestones, maps, and a detailed budget.
- Show how the objectives of your project will achieve the goals of the fund.





Other thoughts about what to include

- Apply for a discrete project with an end goal
- Co-funding can really help mention if you have secured cofunding from other sources on your funding application.
