Karl Walker of Arrowtown Choppers is encouraging local families to get themselves a free Christmas tree – and help halt the spread of wilding pines – by cutting their own from the group's control patch near the Sawpit Gully Loop. 'Why not get the kids up there, pick your own tree, chop it down and take it home?' he says.


The Choppers work close to the Big Hill Track on Wednesdays from 6 pm to 9 pm. 'If you need some help we're happy to give

you a hand during those hours,' says Karl. 'If you're heading up any other time, simply find a conifer you like the look of and help yourself. Just remember it is your responsibility to be safe. You'll have to bring your own tools and appropriate clothing and footwear. And bring a hand saw – no chainsaws allowed!'







"A vibrant, diverse community that is engaged in managing its future in a way that values and protects its heritage, character, lifestyle and the natural environment sustainably."






